The annual fall meeting of the  
Loudoun County Teachers Associa-  
tion was held in the High  
School building at Lovettsville on  
Saturday, December 13th. The  
meeting was called to order by  
the President, Mr. R. F. Braxton.  
The opening exercises consisted  
in singing "America," reading  
of the 19th Psalm and prayer by  
Rev. Parrish.

Uniform Examination for Sev-  
enth Grade was first discussed.  
Mr. Barrett made an address  
upon this subject. On account  
of length of terms, he believes  
this cannot be done unless the  
schools end at the same time. A

"Round Table" discussion was  
conducted on this subject by  
Supt. Edmondson, in which  
Profs. Adkins, Simpson, Felts  
and Hunter took part.

Rev. Parrish made an inspir-  
ing address upon the "Province  
of the Teacher." He says "Effi-  
ciency is the keynote of good  
teaching" common sense and  
education combined are invinc-  
ible forces.

Miss Blanch Ankers made a  
splendid report for the Grammer  
Grade department, which she  
represented in the Richmond  
Conference. Upon request of the  
Association, a brief synopsis is  
given:

"The first general meeting was  
held on Wednesday morning at  
the John Marshall High School.  
Mr. Paul Spencer of Norfolk  
made an address upon "The  
Teacher's Challenge, which in  
my humble estimation was the  
most inspiring of the entire con-  
ference. He touched upon the  
different challenges that come to  
different people; as the challenge  
that the stars hold out to the as-  
tronomer, or that which disease

puts before the doctor. The  
teacher should not only study  
dormant possibilities of the pupil  
but should enter every field of  
knowledge. The teacher should  
study and think the thoughts of  
God, and as St. Paul says, he  
should "study to show thyself  
approved unto God a working

man that needeth not to be  
ashamed, just as the valley of the  
Nile is fruitful because of the  
overflowing love of the teacher  
bring forth fruit in the lives of
